
Workshop Thinking the "other" from the Historical Perspective

The international workshop titled Thinking the "other" from the Historical Perspective was held on Monday 2nd and Tuesday 3rd September, bringing together young scholars from Charles University and various international institutions. Participants included emerging researchers from the US, UK, India, San Marino, Turkey, Belgium, Austria, Estonia, Lithuania, and Hungary, among other countries. This gathering aimed to foster a rich and interdisciplinary discussion on the historical treatment of the "Other" in diverse contexts.

The workshop featured more than 30 young scholars who presented their research in 11 different sessions.
