## "Globalization and the British Empire"

For better or worse, much of the world learnt how to be modern during the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries under British rule or indirect domination. In 1920 the British Empire had the same global 'weight' as China does today. What has been the politico-cultural legacy of the British Empire's dominance, decline, fall and aftermath? That includes the effects on the British themselves, and upon the empire's neo-fascist offspring in South Africa under *apartheid* (1948-1994) and in Burma/Myanmar under military tyranny (1962-2015). This lecture presents a specific take on the sociology of globalization that emphasizes the part played by forced displacement.
